Change in Cape Town-

Exciting news from Cape Town...this spring Solomon Makosana took over as Program Director of the Amy Biehl Foundation Trust. Solomon has been with the ABFT since 2001 and has been doing a wonderful job. His experience in education along with his tremendous people skills has brought a wealth of support and involvement from South Africans of all races, ethnicities and economic status. Solomon replaced Ashleigh Murphy who served the Amy Biehl Foundation Trust tirelessly for several years. Ashleigh remains in Cape Town and still serves as a Trustee, her years of dedicated service is truly appreciated.

Solomon Makosana's Profile-

- Solomon served as a headmaster for 15 years.
- Became an inspector of education for 6 years.
- Qualified at UCT BA Hons. (History) B.E.D. (UWC).
- Solomon is a member of the board for SA Institute of Race Relations, Primary Science Program, Extra-Mural Education Program and St. Josephs College.
- Solomon also is a member of the Black Cricket Forum and the WP Cricket.

Solomon was employed by the ABFT after the tragic death of a colleague Zunade Dharsey. He left Public Education after he was convinced that the Provincial Government of the Western Cape (under Democratic Alliance) was not prepared to cherish the transformation of education. Solomon saw in the ABFT a credible organization which was grass rooted and could enable him to have an impact on his community. Whilst the vision of the ABFT is to Weave a Barrier Against Violence by making use of a number of education programs, he said to himself "as a believer in education as a liberation mechanism, here is an organization that I can identify and associate myself with".

"I was fascinated by the incredible story of Amy Biehl. It practically demonstrated what reconciliation, forgiveness and restorative justice are about. The tragic death of Amy and the lessons there of have left many South Africans spell-bound."

Program Updates-After School Programs

The ABFT currently sponsors four After School Care Programs at primary schools in Guguletu, Khayelitsha and Strand. They serve over **700** children Monday through Thursday afternoons. Students are educated in life skills, drama, dance, arts and culture, literacy and math. Teacher development and training takes place on Fridays. Children receive a nutritious meal including sandwiches and soup in the winter months.

The Mural Project operating as part of the After School Care Programs involves **30** boys. Students are trained in basic art and painting skills and design and paint

murals which are displayed in their communities and in the United States.

Sports Development

Evolving from what was once part of our After School Care Programs, this project promotes the physical, mental and spiritual values of sport. We have recently partnered with the City of Cape Town for resources and venues that provide soccer, chess, handball, table tennis, boxing, basketball and netball. Our soccer and netball teams have begun to play matches against city teams.

Youth Reading Role Models

Run during the school day in over 20 primary schools, this program trains grade 7 students in reading aloud to grade 1 students. Approximately **200** grade 7 readers and **3000** grade 1 students are currently participating. The program also hosts guest readers to model quality reading skills. Brian O'Connell, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Western Cape was our recent guest. More recently, an ABFT-sponsored parent reading club has brought adult learning in creative reading and drama skills.

Amy Biehl Music Program

Currently **1000** students in grades 4, 5, 6 and 7 participate in this program hosted by two primary schools. Two music instructors train students in music theory and practice on the recorder. Through partnerships with the South African Navy Band, Diocesan College, and the Bishops Boys School, the Foundation currently provides **25** committed students with further training in violin, guitar, piano, and saxophone.

First Aid Training

The Foundation sponsors Level 1 first aid training courses for community participants free of charge. Since it's inception in 1998, over **5000** people have been trained and issued Level 1 first aid certificates. Some of the programs greatest successes has come through workshops and training in Cape Town's Malmesbury, Pollsmoor, and Goodwood prisons.

Peer Education Program

Having already trained **60** HIV/AIDS peer educators in George, the program has recently come to Cape Town. Fifty-nine primary and high school students are now being trained to reach out within their own schools and to their peers.

Condom Distribution

With the help of the city, we distribute several thousand condoms a month in public locations such as clubs, trainstations, corporate buildings, and convention halls. In the last year, more than **600,000** condoms have been distributed by the Foundation.

Greening and Environment Program

Working with Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens and the University of the Western Cape, this program improves the external environment of participating schools while developing school based environmental education programs. The program has been implemented in 15 schools, work shopping approximately **1000** students to date, on the cultivation of plants.

Khayelitsha Golf Driving Range

Our range was officially opened in May 2000 and represents the only driving range in any of the townships adjacent to Cape Town. Fifteen local high schools visit the range on a weekly basis to be trained by club coaches. The range is also in the process of becoming an "eco-park" with the goal of generating and distributing alternative energy to its surrounding communities.

Program and Staff Changes-

The Amy Biehl Foundation has been forced to close our George operation including the Community Baking Trust. Amy's Bread is still sold in Western Cape Pic n' Pay grocery stores. Financial strains of these programs began to take away from our more successful projects in the Cape Flats and could be maintained no longer. When Peter and Linda Biehl began the Foundation, their aim was always extracting the potential of all their employees and volunteers and to encourage their metamorphosis. ABFT's Samora April has moved on after four years to pursue other career opportunities. We are very happy for Samora yet, we will miss him. Another difficult goodbye came with the departure of Leyla Hairdarian. Leyla and her husband Ryan have moved to Johannesburg to mentor young black filmmakers.

The Amy Biehl Foundation has been sending out letters requesting a donation of \$100 from 1000 of our most eager supporters. Amy Biehl High School Graduates First Senior Class!

In 2000, Amy Biehl High School opened its doors in an effort to give every student, regardless of learning ability or socio-economic status, the chance to succeed. Our mission is one of scholarship and community service, just like our namesake.

We set the bar high, requiring that every student pass two college classes at the University of New Mexico or the Albuquerque Technical and Vocational Institute in order to graduate. Additionally, every student must design and complete a year-long community service project that is relevant to their college coursework. We wanted our young people to prove that they could make it at the next level before leaving us, and to care about the issues facing their community.

We sought Linda and Peter's consent in naming the school after Amy, a person that young people could relate to, and they graciously agreed. But the road to success has been long, and there was a time early on, when I called Peter and conveyed my fears that what we had set out to do might not be possible. "Don't worry", he reassured me, "we have faith in young people."

Now four years later, on May 22nd, 2004, all twenty-six of our seniors in the first graduating class successfully completed their college classes and defined their passion for community service. For instance five of our students raised \$50,000 and built a Habitat for Humanity House, naming it "The Amy and Peter Biehl House."

Peter and Linda believed in us from the start, and four years later, their son Zach stood up, at the same age Amy was when she passed away, and addressed our graduates, encouraging them to not let anything stand in the way of their dreams. It was a very inspiring speech, which included the reading of Amy's last journal entry, which ended with "And here I go!"

"And here YOU go", continued Zach, "Don't be content with just stopping to smell the roses, plant a few rose bushes yourself!" Spoken just like a Biehl.

On a lighter note, later that night, Zach entertained us all at the staff graduation party with his rendition of James Brown's "Get Up"! Needless to say, a good time was had by all, and as always, we appreciate the support of the Biehl Family.

The week of July 12th-16th the Amy Biehl Foundation collaborated with the Brad Evans Foundation, Community School Partnership Fund, the Orange County Department of Education, Orange County Human Relations, Soka University, and TAP (Tolerance Among People) Club to present the Warren L. Steinberg Summer Leadership Institute for Teens. This 5-day program was named for Warren L. Steinberg, a wonderful man and decorated community activist, ironically Mr. Steinberg passed away on the Sunday preceding the Institute's beginning.
